# Inflammatory acne

Inflammatory acne is a common problem that predominantly affects teenagers but also older individuals as well. There is no treatment that is guaranteed to resolve this troublesome condition but various methods have been used before with varying degrees of success. One method that has been considered in the past has been laser treatment. We feel that there is enough evidence now to support this as an option to offer it in our Laser Clinic. As this treatment is not covered by the NHS, it has to be delivered privately.

# How the laser works

Bright yellow light is fired by the laser onto the skin. This light is absorbed into the surface layers of the skin. This is thought to reduce the activity of the bacteria that are a major contributor to the recurrent activity in the acne.

#### Number of treatments

We would advise a minimum of two treatments with an interval of six weeks. It is possible that patients might benefit from having more treatments. If there is a good result from the first two treatments then there may be a gap of

several months before anything further needs to be done. It would be unlikely for the laser to completely resolve the acne permanently.

# How the treatment feels

- When you arrive, you will meet the clinic staff involved in the laser treatment. They will explain the treatment to you.
- The pulses of laser light feel like gentle elastic band flicks. No anaesthetic is necessary but we will offer the use of a cold air blowing device, which eases the sensation.
- Everyone in the treatment room must wear protective eyewear when the laser is being used. If the area is very near the eye, special goggles will be used.

## Additional information

- If you have a suntan or an artificial tan, we will aim to re-arrange your appointment as this reduces the effectiveness of the treatment.
- Photographs may be taken of the area to be treated so that progress can be monitored. The photographs will be kept in your hospital notes. If you wear makeup on the area to be treated, you will be asked to remove this before

- having your photograph taken.
- If you wear make-up over the treatment area, please bring along any lotions usually used to remove it.
- If you have a cold sore or other skin infection in the area to be treated, please inform the laser clinic staff as treatment must be delayed until the area is completely healed.

## After treatment

- Usually there is very little to see immediately after treatment.
  Any resulting discomfort is generally dealt with adequately by paracetamol. However, most patients will find that nothing is required for the pain.
- We would advise a second treatment at approximately four weeks after the first one. Further treatments will depend on the response.
